Civil war continued to ravage the southern regions when insurgents attacked a small town on the outskirts of the capital. Close to 2,000, including women and children, were burned to death and scores of others were critically wounded in the residential enclave just kilometers from the government center.

Tanks rolled through the cluster of concrete homes and trailers, destroying everything in their wake. Torn bodies are still being pulled from the rubble and no official death count has yet been released. This is the sixth such attack in recent weeks and the latest in a five year struggle, bringing the death toll to 250,000.

Citizens in the south, already ravaged by years of fighting and religious persecution, are now facing drought conditions and starvation. No official plans have yet been made to airlift food or medical assistance to the local population. Southern leaders say they have pleaded with the centrist government to call for a mandatory ceasefire but have received no reply. Fleeing refugees are heading east but say no final destination has yet been established.

In the meantime, the atrocities continue. As the insurgents continue to push forward, civilian mass executions have been reported throughout the area. Hundreds of mass graves have already been dug to accommodate the growing number of dead and still more will be needed. Rebel leaders say that what they are calling "ethnic cleansing" will continue until their demands are met. Thousands of refugees are trapped between the warring factions but as yet no neighboring countries have opened their borders. The World Health Foundation has reported outbreaks of cholera and typhus in the hastily organized camps. After years of bitter struggle and bloodshed, the prospects for peace seem all but hopeless.
